Van Gogh Museum The largest collection of one of the most famous artists in the world can be found nowhere else but in Amsterdam. The Van Gogh Museum (pronounced "von-hoe") is worth a couple hours of your time to see the over 200 works on display and learn about the artists fascinating history.

Visitation Tip: visit the museum from 9 am to 11 am or after 3 pm. The busiest times are between 11 am and 3 pm.

**Anne Frank House** Three minutes walking from the hotel is the Anne Frank House. The small museum and only takes about an hour to visit. That said, it's an emotional experience and I suggest scheduling something low key for the rest of the day.

Ticketing Tip: Plan ahead! Tickets are ONLY sold online. 80% of tickets for any date are released exactly two months in advance at noon (Amsterdam time) The remaining 20% become available at 9:00 am local time on the day itself. https://www.annefrank.org/en/museum/tickets/

**Rent a Boat** A perfect way to see this city of canals is by private boat. You can rent and drive yourselves but I suggest hiring a captain for stress free navigation. Feeling less adventurous? Consider a paddle boat instead!

**Rent Bikes** Amsterdam is arguably the most bike friendly city in the world. I suggest renting a bike (ask the hotel for the closest shop) and checking out the major sites on two wheels. Average prices are only €8-10 for the day. Biking is generally very safe but look out for tram tracks as they are known for catching wheels and toppling tourists!

**Vondelpark** This park is an urban oasis in the heart of Amsterdam that is a great place to people watch. Spread out a blanket and have picnic, read a book, bike or stroll through the park and see sculpture works by Picasso. The several ponds make excellent photo opportunities and keep your eyes peeled for a flock of wild parakeets.

"The Nines" are an easy walk from your hotel adjacent to the larger district of **Jordaan.**

Bilbao

**Transfer** The easiest way to reach your hotel is by metered taxi. The price should be between 25 – 30 Euros total. http://www.aena.es/en/bilbao-airport/taxi.html



**Guggenheim** Even if you don't like modern art this is the one site you must see while in Bilbao. Designed by the famous architect Frank Gehry, inside are nineteen galleries with temporary exhibitions of contemporary art. At just ten Euros, the visit is definitely worth a few hours of your time.

Photo Tip: Walk across the **La Salve Bridge** to the other side of the river and capture the Guggenheim complex in its entirety.

**Fine Arts Museum** This is another art museum within walking distance of your hotel, only 5 min from the Guggenheim. Great collection of Basque art as well as more famous international works by Picasso, Martin De Vos, and Francisco Dey Goya. Ten Euro entry but it's free after 6pm and SHOULD also be free to anyone under 25, although they may restrict this to locals only.

Casco Viejo Before the sun goes down check out the beautiful architecture of the Casco Viejo (over 700 years old) and wander the narrow streets. Enjoy small bars and sunny squares to sit and enjoy pintxos and a glass of wine at no more than two euros each. Pintxos (pronounced peen-chos) are Basque version of tapas and it is obligatory to try as many 'pintxos' as you can – each one with a different flavor.

La Ribera Market While in Casco Viejo don't miss the largest covered market in Europe. Inside you'll find the entire spectrum of the Basque Country's gastronomical goods. The market closes in the evening but the food court is definitely open. It has a large collection of booths selling an incredible array of Pintxos and Potes (drinks). You'll often see specials titled "Pintxo Pote" and that means a small food/drink combo!

**Cathedral de Santiago** The oldest Catholic church in Bilbao is found in Casco Viejo ~ 20 min walk or 8 min taxi from your hotel. The beauty of this particular cathedral is within the mix of architectural styles as it was built and expanded over the years. You will need to pay to go inside but they do include a nice audio guide.

Photo tip: The front of the church is best photographed in the late afternoon hours. http://catedralbilbao.com/

Live Music Near your hotel you'll find Residence Cafe which should have live music on Wednesdays. La Antigua Cigarrería is a local Bilbao institution known for its cocktails. They often have a live band or DJ. I would also check and see if any artists are performing a the large theatre and concert venue Kafe Antzokia <a href="http://www.kafeantzokia.eus/en/calendar/">http://www.kafeantzokia.eus/en/calendar/</a>

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San Sebastian / Donostia

Transfer You'll want to catch a bus from the Bilbao TERMIBUS station to San Sebastian, which costs less than 7€ and takes ~ 1 hr 15 min. I would suggest booking these tickets at least a week in advance as this is high season and using the ASLA bus company over other options. Note that buses to San Sebastian may say "Donostia" not San Sebastian on the front.

**Semana Grande** Aug 10th – 17th is "Big Week" in San Sebastian, which is a festival celebrating Virgins Day and combining the International Firework Competition in the middle of **La Concha Bay**. These days of fiesta include cultural and sporting events, regattas, "pelota" matches, live music, theatre, and a major series of bullfights in the **Illumbe Bullring**.

**La Concha Beach** One of the nicest urban beaches you'll find anywhere in the world. La Concha, the symbol of San Sebastian (or Donostia as the locals say) is a beautiful crescent shaped stretch of sand that is an easy 3 min walk from your hotel. It gets crowded in summer so I suggest going early.

**Santa Clara Island** Santa Clara Island, which can be accessed via ferry every 30 min, is the tiny island you'll see in La Concha Bay. It has a small beach for swimming and fantastic views from the top. The island features a charming lighthouse and cafe but I suggest bringing your own snacks and drinks for a picnic.

**Monte Igueldo** The best viewpoint above the city! It offers an impressive panorama over San Sebastian's coastlines and mountains. Access to the peak is via the antique railway, which was first opened in 1912. There's also a small amusement park and tower at the top you can climb for a small fee. This will provide you with the iconic San Sebastian birds eye photo!

**La Catedral del Buen Pastor** 5 min from your hotel is this beautiful cathedral with a neo-Gothic exterior yet a rather classic interior. It is one of the most significant religious buildings in the Basque region and well worth the short trip.

Visitation tip: The entrance is free outside of service hours and I suggest visiting on a bright sunny day when the stained glass is brilliantly lit.

**Parte Vieja** This is the "Old Town" of San Sebastian and most likely where you'll want to eat your meals. It's also an interesting place to wander as you will find narrow streets and lanes, interesting small shops, churches, pastry stores, produce markets and of course, numerous pintxos bars.

Pintxos favorites: Arguably the best in Parte Vieja are Goiz Argi, La Cuchara de San Telmo, Atari Gastroteka, Borda Berri.

**San Telmo Museum** Spend an hour here to learn about Basque history and culture. Although there is not much English in some areas of the museum, the interactive displays are self explanatory. It can also be an ideal spot if there is some rain or too much heat, as most activities in Donostia are outdoors.

Barcelona

Transfer Options The fastest option is taking a Barcelona airport taxi, which costs around 30 to 40€ on the taximeter. There are taxi stands at the airport but I suggest downloading MyTaxi App, which is similar to Uber but uses regular taxis to handle the rides. You can use it throughout the city. https://mytaxi.com/

If you buy the **Barcelona City Pass** (see below) it includes **AeroBus** transfers from Terminal 1 to **Placa de Catalunya**. Otherwise the ticket cost 5.90€ one way and takes around ~30 minutes to reach the city center. From there you will need to walk ~10 min to your hotel or take a short taxi. http://www.aerobusbcn.com/

City Passes There are four competing cards/passes that you can purchase in advance to streamline the ticket purchases and entry to Barcelona attractions. For first time visitors with at least three days to explore, I recommend the Barcelona City Pass with the 1 day hop-on hop-off bus option. The basic pass includes free entrance and and skip-the-line to the top two monuments, Park Guell and Sagrada Familia, AeroBus transfers to/from the airport as well as 20% off at a host of other attractions. This is the only pass that is not time restricted and handles ticketing completely online by email.

Free Citywide WiFI The city council has installed free wifi access points in almost all locations throughout Barcelona. Save on your data roaming by looking for the network name "Barcelona WiFi"

**Barcelona Metro** This is the one city I would suggest using public transportation as much as possible. Traffic can be bad and August is high season for tourism.

Ticketing Tips: The 10 Journey option is much cheaper than buying individual tickets because each journey works out to half price! More than one person can use the ticket at the same time, just pass the ticket back and your companion can put it through the machine too. A 'journey' lasts 1 hour 15 min, so you can change metros as many times as you want in that time and even transfer to a bus. Remember to validate your ticket each time in the machine provided.

Antoni Gaudí In addition to Sagrada Família, I would make time to visit two of Gaudi's architectural masterpieces, the Casa Batlló and Casa Milà, which are both 20% off with the Barcelona City Pass. For each, I suggest you purchase your tickets online and in advance. These are incredible buildings that were turned into unique pieces of art and should not be missed.

Visitation tip: Visit **Casa Milà** at night. The lighting is amazing, the crowds are much smaller, and they serve you a glass of sparkling Spanish wine at the end.

**Flamenco Dance** Two minutes walking from your hotel is one of the oldest and arguably most authentic Flamenco theatres in Barcelona. Being high season, you'll want to pick a date and purchase your tickets well in advance.

**Montserrat** This is a monastery and place of pilgrimage dating back to Roman times. It's also simply a gorgeous mountain range just 45 km away from the city. A refreshing natural place to take in the views, relax, hike, and breath fresh air!
